In Judaism, intention counts, especially for a negative outcome.

If a man kills an innocent person on purpose, he forfeits his life. If it's an accident, the penalty is less severe. If a woman steals someone's livelihood, by blocking their access to a needed resource, the penalty is severe. However, if she

out-competes someone with superior products or services, or better value, there is no penalty.

In today's world we can use a little bit of the old wisdom in both directions.


If someone hurts us, we are compelled to do all we can to determine their intention before we react. It is a corollary of "an eye for an eye," meaning don't over-react to a perceived slight.

The opposite is also true. If an enemy promises to hurt you or your clan and then does hurt or even kill, then the punishment should fit the crime.

One can imagine a scenario where forgiveness might be possible, especially if the opposing forces were manipulated into conflict.

In each conflict, whether between two people or peoples, the first step is always to stop hurting each other. The issue is not who caused the first pain, but rather, can both resist resuming the hurting. The clear intention would be to not give in to the temptation of "just one more."

Resisting that temptation may take the greatest strength of all.

On Purim, the illusion of our disconnectedness is lifted like a great veil; all we have to do is embrace this truth. As with most great revelations, the first step begins with the maxim "know thyself"—and beyond this, dare to BE thyself. In the Purim story, the character Esther risked her own life by revealing her true identity; she stood up to those who would have destroyed her people. Few of us realize our own power or the fact that real change can begin when we choose to act and draw from our true essence, which is connected to the Light... that the only way to banish Purim's Haman (a character representing the darkest inclinations of humanity) is to tap into this Light.

Purim opens an incredible opportunity for us to embrace this fully and to thereby bring blessings to ourselves and the world.

Instead of doing more for myself today, do something unexpected (and even anonymous, which is tradition for this day) for someone else. Make it this day's goal to find, express, and share your Light for the betterment of all!


























MENSCH OF THE MONTH

March "Mensch of the Month" Alan Kisseloff

Alan Kisseloff, Congregation B'nai Torah's March "Mensch of the Month" uses his extensive wisdom and accumulated learnings to help others. Service is always his underlying motive.

Like so many of us, his paternal grandparents emigrated from the Pale in Czarist Russia, a small village near Kiev soon after the pogroms of 1905. His grandmother, a woman of great faith and intelligence studied law before leaving Russia. They arrived in Williamsburg, NY where his grandfather sold dry goods. Alan's father was an attorney and at an early age, Alan assumed that he would follow in his father's footsteps. The family moved to a predominantly Jewish neighborhood in the Long Island suburb of East Meadow where the postwar suburbs replaced the potato fields (even when you tried to plant grass, the potatoes would appear...) However, rather than schoolwork, his childhood was devoted to sports, stickball and football in the street and basketball. He also began a lifelong fascination with trains. He had what today would be diagnosed as attention deficit disorder, but with a photographic memory, "coasted" through high school with good grades.

With the encouragement of his grandmother, Alan was an active participant in the local Temple Emanuel, of which his parents were founding members, leading Saturday morning services when in high school. He also participated in extended family celebrations in all Jewish holidays, which has continued throughout his life.

At Hobart College, Alan realized he had to "wake up" and study if he were to attain his goal of becoming a lawyer. While he majored in political science, he stayed away from the radical politics that engulfed many colleges in the late days of the Vietnam War. From Hobart, Alan followed his planned path to St. John's University School of Law. He describes passing the bar with his ADHD as perhaps the hardest thing he has ever done, relying on his photographic memory and uncountable hours of studying.

Alan spent his professional career as a partner at two boutique law firms, specializing in Real Estate and Banking. He commuted daily on the LIRR from Baldwin, NY. He married Jared's mother who he met in sleep away camp, after his first year of law school. Although they divorced, they remain a very close family.

However, at age 47, in 1999, Alan did what many of us think about but do not act upon in middle age. Finding his life unfulfilling, remarried with Evan and Brittany in tow he and Nancy moved their family to Florida to be near her father, Alan took a job at Lowe's so that he could learn to drive a forklift! This was followed by a 13-year career with Palm Coast Data, a magazine subscription fulfillment company. But freed from the all-time consuming commute to New York City combined with his law practice he could now devote his considerable talents to serving a community and helping others.

He became a Volunteer Judge for the Volusia County Teen Court, helping teens to avoid ruining their future because of one mistake. He joined Temple Israel, became the Principal in the Religious School and taught there and at Bet Safer. He joined our Congregation B'nai Torah in 2001 and has served as Co-President, Vice-President and as a Board Member and support in management in multiple functions. He is on the Board of the Jewish Federation, volunteers at the Doliner Food Pantry, and manages two cemeteries.

His time is Florida, however, has been marked with sadness and near tragedy. Nancy, the love of his life passed away prematurely. His younger son, Evan, was miraculously the sole survivor of a plane crash in 2012 but lost his best friend.

Alan first experienced antisemitism in an unusual way; in high school in a predominantly Jewish suburb, when he went to school during some Jewish holidays, he encountered hostility from the gentile students who felt his presence meant that they had to work and not "goof off"... He is encouraged that the local authorities in Ormond Beach took antisemitic outbursts in the past few years seriously and expressed strong outrage. He feels deeply about the safety of Israel and is exasperated by the discounting of the human shield factor of the terrorists in world opinion. He thinks Golda Meir's saying "we won't have peace until they love their children more than they hate us" is unfortunately a sad reality.

At age 72, Alan Kisseloff is busier than ever; he is using his life lessons to help our Congregation and the community. It is truly a life well lived with hopefully much more to follow.

We need volunteers for the Membership and Visiting Committees.

Please consider volunteering a couple of hours a week or more to visit congregants at nursing homes, the hospital, or their homes. We also need volunteers for the Lunch Buddy Program to take older congregants out for coffee or lunch. We also need volunteers to write welcome cards for new members, to call potential members, to call members who are sick, and to write get-well cards.
