A Message From Rabbi Kane



Passover Again! (Notice the Exclamation Point!).

Passover is the Queen of the starting over holidays. (Clearly the King is Rosh Hashana and an "Honorable Mention" goes to Shabbat.) If Shabbat is for being thankful and starting each week anew and Rosh Hashanah is for finding a better version of ourselves, what might Passover be for?

Passover is the holiday for seeing differently. Just as the Jews were at the Sea and saw no way across to escape and God told Moses to raise his staff and the Sea parted, so too, must we understand there is more strength and power within ourselves to persevere than there are enemies who wish us ill.

We let bad news and threats overwhelm our space and time. Imagine any middle school and any child who is picked on by a bully. Eventually, the victim anticipates the bully around every corner in every minute, I nflicting fear onto his own life.

How different are we in a world which feels strikingly more dangerous to us? We anticipate danger in every moment, on every corner.

Passover, our holiday of freedom encourages us to try to see the world differently, not to the exclusion of any bad thing happening, but being free with faith in ourselves and God to persevere, to make it in life to a better place and time. And, to appreciate all that we have in this time.

Some time ago, two thugs pasted antisemitic stickers on a lightpole near our building. There are more than 600,000 people in Volusia County, most of whom have no awareness of our existence. They are busy living their lives. Many here wish us health happiness and success. Some hate us for all the usual reasons.

On Passover we try to free ourselves from the enslavement of one sign of antisemitism. In our age, once you see some kind of bad nearby, our newsfeeds bring us more evidence of those bad things no matter how far away they are.

Once again, Judaism at Passover does not claim there is no bad. It claims that we have to free ourselves from seeing bad in every place at every time. So that we can help.

Friends,

I have been select by Jewish Nation Fund(JNF) to be one of the representatives from the Southeastern United States to travel to Israel this July. Our mission is simple but not easy. By talking with Israelis and each other, what does Zionism look like as these conflicts end? What does the Israel we pray for look like? How can we support the Jewish people?

The JNF is subsidizing most of the expenses, with each participant raising enough funds to cover airfare, insurance and some incidentals. Would you consider making a donation? I will need to raise \$2000-\$2800. THE KABBALAH KORNER BY HOWARD Sharing wisdom from a 3,000 year old mystical tradition April 2025 Nissan-Iyar, 5785 THE OMER

So why the Omer? As written in The Arvei Nachal, this system of the Counting of the Omer is one of the more magnificent gifts the Creator gives us. Not only do we have the ability to stop the process of falling (which is the purpose of Passover), but the Creator also gave us a booster into the process of elevating through the 50 Gates of Purity. Kabbalah teaches that the Creator interacts with the human world through seven channels or sefirot, and these channels are reflected in us through 49 aspects of our personality. The seven channels are the seven basic human traits that make up the foundation of the human experience. At the root of all suffering is a misalignment of one or more of these traits. Through the Counting of the Omer, we can realign ourselves as we focus on that week's specific trait and the corresponding aspect of humanity. The Counting of the Omer takes approximately five to ten minutes—we all have an extra ten minutes—each night for the 49 nights between Passover and Shavuot. By engaging in the practice, we are brought to thoughts, words, actions, and circumstances that help us to cleanse and grow through all of these specific traits and emotions. Below is an outline of the consciousness for each week of the Omer.

Week 1: Chesed ~ Loving-Kindness: This week focuses on the ways we love, how we give love, and how we receive love. It is the pure energy of our being and the foundation of our lives. Week 2: Gevurah ~ Justice & Discipline: This week, we examine all the ways we reveal our love through logic, discipline, and discernment. Love requires direction and focus, which are found through restriction. Week 3: Tiferet ~ Harmony & Compassion: This week builds upon Chesed and Gevurah, exploring how we focus and reveal love through compassion, honesty, and selflessness. Week 4: Netzach ~ Endurance: This week, the focus is on the self, examining ambition, drive, and tenacity and how we balance those traits with patience and determination. Week 5: Hod ~ Humility: This week, we focus on our humility. During Netzach, we look at what we wish to accomplish; this week, we bring modesty to our pursuits. We look at all of our strengths, remembering they come not from us but from the Creator. Week 6: Yesod ~ Bonding: Building upon the first five weeks, which deal primarily with the self, we now look at the ways we connect and the quality of those connections, examining the bonds of each relationship in our life and how those bonds are nurtured. Week 7: Malchut ~ Sovereignty & Leadership: Finally, we arrive at Malchut, the state of being when all six states of being are aligned. This week, we focus on all the ways in which we embody leadership and look to examine our independence and confidence.

Last year was the first time in my lifetime that I engaged in the counting of the Omer, and it was an awaking to my spiritual journey. It was not always comfortable, but the discomfort was the first indicator that I was on the right path.



MENSCH OF THE MONTH

April "Mensch of the Month" Adrienne Cooperman

Our April "Mensch of Month" Adrienne Cooperman has dedicated her life with an everlasting sense of optimism and compassion to helping others, to the benefit of many in our part of Florida, refugees from the Former Soviet Union, Jewish families, and the B'Nai Torah congregants.

Like so many of us, her family came from the "Pale" in czarist Russia in present day Latvia. Her great-grandfather, who was a tailor, left in 1904 to avoid being conscripted in the Russian army. After an interim stop in England, he arrived at Ellis Island in 1906 and sent for his wife and four children. They settled in the Bronx, where they had four more children. His son, Adrienne's grandfather, honorably served in World War 1. He then moved his family to Harford, Connecticut. Adrienne's father volunteered and served in World War 2 and survived but returned unfortunately 100% disabled. He met his future wife at his brother's bar mitzvah, and they married in 1950.

They had two sons and two daughters, with Adrienne the youngest, and in 1966, moved south to Deltona where Makle Brothers were building a new housing development. It was a small town "in the middle of nowhere" and Adrienne remembers a childhood of riding bicycle and playing amid the housing construction sights. Her mother died of cancer after a lengthy illness when Adrienne was only ten. Her oldest brother was in Vietnam, the other brother was in the navy and her sister was moving away, and she became close to her father, who dedicated his life to helping other disabled veterans. She remembers her car trunk full of prosthetics... While in high school she volunteered at the Conklin Center. When she was seventeen, her father was remarried, and they moved to Ormond Beach.

After high school, Adrienne attended Daytona Community College and then finished her undergraduate studies at the University of Central Florida, receiving a bachelor's degree in social work. While initial work was in respiratory therapy, Adrienne struggled dealing with situations resulting in losing patients. She found a home with the Kinneret Apartments for five years then worked for the Jewish Federation Community Center in Orlando where for sixteen years she was a Social Worker in situations that could lead through her efforts to positive outcomes. While there, she completed a master's degree in social work at the University of Central Florida in 2002 as well as caring for her aging father and stepmother. Unfortunately, her father passed away, also in 2002. In addition to her work for Jewish family services, , Adrienne worked at resettling Jewish refugees from the Forme<u>Fo</u>Soviet Union through 2007. Good things can happen to good people. In 2004, Adrienne, who had dedicated her life to helping others and caring for her family, met_Larry Cooperman and they were married in 2006!

In 2013, Adrienne moved to work at Halifax Health Medical Center as a case manager in discharge planning and has continued with Brooks Rehab in the same position since 2018. Always striving for the positive, she assists patients recovering from severe injuries and illnesses to adjust to life_outside a medical facility, whether in recovering insurance money, getting physical therapy, or establishing a residence.

Adrienne's grandparents established Temple Shalom in Deltona, where she was the first bat mitzvah. (She was initially the only child in the congregation) Her work with the Jewish Community Center in Orlando reinforced her sense of Jewish identity and it was there in 1992 that she met and began a lasting friendship with then-Cantor of SW Orlando Congregation David Kane. She was instrumental in his receiving an offer to have his first congregation as a Rabbi in Deltona and when he moved to Ormond Beach as our rabbi in 1998, she followed him to became one of the first congregants. She has been an active member of Congregation B'nai Torah, volunteering for multiple tasks and serving as Vice President and Co-President.

Adrienne's' only experience with antisemitism as a girl was when a girlfriend was not allowed to come to her birthday party because of religion. She feels that we are in a fortunate "bubble" in the Ormond Beach area with a supportive community. However, she is distraught and angry about the ethnic antisemitism that she reads about in so many of our universities. She was planning to take her first trip to Israel last year, but it was cancelled due to events. She feels that Israel is especially important because Jews will always need a place where they are welcome and safe. We need volunteers for the Membership and Visiting Committees.

Please consider volunteering a couple of hours a week or more to visit congregants at nursing homes, the hospital, or their homes. We also need volunteers for the Lunch Buddy Program to take older congregants out for coffee or lunch. We also need volunteers to write welcome cards for new members, to call potential members, to call members who are sick, and to write get-well cards.
