### A Message From Rabbi Kane

In the old country, the story is told of two villages and two horse races.

In the first village, one breed of horses were all white with a rough diamond shaped brown spot above it's eyes and the second breed were all white with a rough circle spot in the same place. The fastest horse from each breed was selected every spring for a race during the Lag B'Omer Picnic.

In the village, in the weeks before the race, fans of each breed explained to anyone who would listen what was wrong with the opposing horse; it's parentage, its pasture, its trainer, even commenting negatively about the people in the community in favor of the opposite breed.

On the night before the race, each group sets up its own camp to roast meat and talk about how great they and their horse trainers are.

On the day of the big race, inevitably, one horse won by a nose, after which its fans cheered and then invited the opposite fans to come enjoy babka and mead from a special tent in their camp, where the winning fans serve the losing fans. The losing fans also bring drink and food to share. The trainer of the losing horse toasts the trainer of the winning horse and the trainer of the winning horse toasts the trainer of the losing horse, always finishing with a thought like, "we will have to work harder to beat an excellent horse like yours next year."

In the second village the race and the breeds are the same, but the babka and mead are served to each group of fans in separate tents, and the toasts are variously about the defects of the opposite horses and fans.

One year, the mayor of the first village happened to be in the second village on Race day. After the race, he was bewildered by the separate tents. Eventually, he found the mayor of the second village and explained the differences in their customs. The mayor of second village asked why the first village had their post-race party together.

"Well," said the visiting mayor, "we realized that being in different camps is one thing, but if we don't find a way to be together, we won't have much of a village."

### Sharing wisdom from a 3,000 year old mystical tradition January, 2025 Tevet—Shevat, 5785

As we move into the beginning of a new Gregorian calendar year, I thought I would share some insight into the Kabbalistic calendar that you might find interesting.......

The Gregorian (traditional) calendar determines the month and year based on solar cycles, whereas the Kabbalistic Calendar determines the month according to lunar cycles and the year by the solar cycles. In a Kabbalistic Calendar, a month always starts on or near a new moon and has either 29 or 30 days (a lunar cycle is about 29 1/2 days).

Certain days are imbued with the energy of abundance, making them a preferable time to begin something new. These days are an optimal time to plant a seed for new ventures, getting married, buying a home, scheduling important medical procedures and so on. The first day of each month, the New Moon, is a particularly positive day, as it contains the seed of the entire month. Just as positive days have more energy, negative days have less. Seeds planted on negative days have a harder time bearing fruit. If we have an important task to accomplish and a positive day is not an option, a neutral day is preferable over a negative day.

The Sefer Yetzirah (Book of Formation), written by Abraham the Patriarch some 3800 years ago, states that the Hebrew letters are the DNA of the universe. They are the physical representation of the divine energy intelligence that created everything, from the planets to the galaxies. Every month is represented by a sign of the zodiac, and by a planet, both created by a Hebrew letter. The Book of Formation explains that by meditating daily on the Hebrew letters specific to the month, you can influence how your month plays out.

The Ana Beko'ach is an ancient kabbalistic prayer built around a sequence of 42 letters that are encoded within the first 42 letters of the Book of Genesis. Each line of the prayer corresponds to the energy of a particular month, and a specific day of the week. By meditating on the Ana Beko'ach daily, you enrich your life with pure spiritual Light and positive energy.

Every Friday at sundown begins the time known as Shabbat, and it concludes with the setting of the sun on Saturday evening. Kabbalists explain that Shabbat is the only day of the week when the spiritual and physical worlds are united. The Light flows throughout the entire day and is available for you to receive from it as much as you want. Shabbat allows you access to a higher level of your soul than you can connect to during the other six days of the week. This window in time also gives you the opportunity to change your personal destiny at the seed level for the coming week.

Holidays are not about tradition. They are one of the most powerful technologies available to you for improving your life. Holidays are cosmic windows in time that allow you to connect to different frequencies of spiritual energy. These forces activate and enhance your ability to remove certain types of negativity and chaos, thereby increasing your personal fulfillment. Each holiday provides its own distinct channel to the Light.



### MENSCH OF THE MONTH

### By our Congregant Ray Leonard

Our Rabbi Kane has led an interesting and varied life. His intellect and personality have led him to experiences that have enabled him to be the spiritual guide and friend that we all cherish.

He grew up in a small a town in the Hudson Valley as the youngest of six children, spread in age by 17 years. He had a hard-working, distant father and as the youngest, was naturally close to a kind, caring and religious mother. You will not be surprised that he had an active imagination, loving monster movies and comic books, had a sweet tooth (malted milk balls and chocolate chip cookies) but also was deeply involved in synagogue, leading services as a teenager.

He wished to become a rabbi, then an actor, both professions strongly discouraged by his father. In protest, he refused to apply for college, until his mother persuaded him. He applied to Carnegie Mellon, on advice of a friend and as National Merit semifinalist, of course, he was accepted. He had no interest in his Chemical Engineering studies, however, and after two semesters of mediocre grades, took time off to work at Disney in Orlando, living with his sister. He returned and completed a degree, but his real effort was in student activities, fund raising, disc jockey and earning the Outstanding Student Citizen Award at Graduation. He did learn how to solve problems from his Analysis Systems and Evaluation Courses (ASE) that has helped him for the rest of his life.

Despite having a Chemical Engineering degree, he had no immediate prospects of interest in that subject and returned to Disney where he moved up the ranks as they opened EPCOT Center. However, his father's health was failing and with it the family ladder company business. So, he left Disney and moved back to New York and with his brother took over the company, cut staff in half and quadrupled revenue. Meanwhile his father recovered his health and came back. Unfortunately, it was too many cooks in the proverbial kitchen, so the brothers left.

Disney of course, wanted our Rabbi back, and he returned to help open Disney MGM Studios. While working there, however, he saw the difficulties aged and visitors with disabilities had getting around and started his own company "Friends of Family" which provided wheelchair services and guides to all the theme parks in Orlando. It was so successful that it became Disney's recommended service. The Rabbi's next adventure was with a restaurant "The Outback". By watching Crocodile Dundee repeatedly, he learned to "speak Australian" and became the ambassador of the restaurant, telling tales of the outback.

While working with Outback, he became involved as cantor in the SW Orlando Jewish Congregation. At this point that he decided to dedicate his considerable talents to serving our faith and people. He went to Rabbinate School for four years. After two years as Rabbi in Deltona, a delegation from Ormond Beach forming Congregation B'nai Torah tempted him to lead our congregation, where with his lovely wife Valerie, we have experienced the joy of Judaism these last 27 years.

Current events involving the state of Israel deeply concern Rabbi Kane. He recalls Ariel Sharon's advice, "better a bad peace that a good war." Israel has an extreme fringe that wants to make it a theocracy rather than the beacon of democracy and tolerance that we all look to. Secular Israel needs to come back.

He suggests that religions appear to take about 1500 years to work out their aggressions. For Judaism, this happened by around 400 CD. (the Maccabees had been pretty vicious..) Christianity had their civil wars in the reformation (1500's and 1600's) and the Muslims are about 1500 years after Mohammed.

Hopefully, their violent branches will wither soon.




