A Message From Rabbi Kane



As you may know, I am traveling to Israel in July, bringing with me some prayers created by some students at the Shalom School which I will deliver to the Western Wall in Jerusalem.

"Many Jews observe the practice of placing slips of paper containing written prayers to God into the cracks of the Western Wall. In Jewish tradition the Divine Presence rests upon the Western Wall and also, according to Kabbalah, all prayers ascend to Heaven through the Temple Mount, which the Western Wall abuts."

For hundreds of years, Jews had been prevented or restrained from praying at our Holiest Sites in Jerusalem. Then, over 50 years ago in 1967, our chance came with the liberation of the city, recounted here by Israeli Statesman Yitzhak Rabin of blessed memory:

"There was one moment in the Six-Day War which symbolized the great victory: that was the moment in which the first paratroopers...reached the stones of the Western Wall, feeling the emotion of the place; there never was, and never will be, another moment like it. Nobody staged that moment. Nobody planned it in advance. Nobody prepared it and nobody was prepared for it; it was as if Providence had directed the whole thing: the paratroopers weeping—loudly and in pain—over their comrades who had fallen along the way, the words of the Kaddish prayer heard by Western Wall's stones after 19 years of silence, tears of mourning, shouts of joy, and the singing of 'Hatikvah'"

Brotherhood, Belonging, and Becoming: Why Jewish Men Need the Men's Club

We've all gone through rough patches in our lives, such as wrestling with grief, anxiety, feelings of low self-worth, and guilt over failures. And we fall into an old personal trap of trying to figure it out on our own. Too many Jewish men are quietly holding it all together, shouldering responsibilities, showing up for others, and suppressing the very feelings that make them human. We're partners, fathers, sons, caretakers, providers, and leaders.

The need for deep friendship and spiritual grounding among men is more urgent than ever. The consequences ripple outward. When a man is isolated, emotionally overwhelmed, or cut off from meaningful relationships, it doesn't only affect him, it affects all those around him.

That's where a Jewish Men's club comes in. Rarely are we offered the space to be vulnerable, to reflect, and to reconnect with ourselves and each other. The CBT Men's club is not a luxury, it's a lifeline.

Jewish life teaches that we are not meant to walk alone. Aseh lecha rav, u'kneh lecha chaver— Make for yourself a teacher and acquire for yourself a friend (Pirkei Avot 1:6). Whether through the rituals of chevruta (study partners), mentorship, or communal learning, Jewish masculinity has always found strength in sacred relationships. The benefits aren't just personal, they're generational. When men learn to open their hearts and build deeper relationships, their families thrive. Children get fathers who are more emotionally available. Partners get men who are more grounded, present, and honest. Communities gain leaders who embody Jewish values not only in action, but in intention and empathy. This vision is at the heart of your Men's Club. Brothers, I hope you will join us.

MENSCH OF THE MONTH

March “Mensch of the Month” Lea Moskowitz

Our June “Mensch of the Month” Lea Moskowitz is beloved by our Congregation B’nai Torah Family for her sympathy and kindness and genuine concern for the happiness and well-being of every member.

Lea’s father’s family emigrated to the United States from Germany in the 19th century. His family name was Shatz, which means “well liked person, or emissary of the congregation” in Ashkenazi Hebrew, a perfectly appropriate description of his descendant! Lea’s mother’s family came from the Russian Pale, Kyiv, as with so many of our congregants. On her father’s side the family settled in Portland, Maine, where her grandfather worked as a tailor. Her maternal grandfather worked as a barber. He had a full head of hair and his twin brother, who otherwise looked alike, was bald. He made a good living selling a “hair preservation” tonic claiming that he used it every day and his brother did not...

Lea’s parents moved to New York. Her father did not have a formal education and initially was a “hustler” working everywhere from pool halls to shoeshine stalls. He eventually started a successful business in printing and dye cutting, with several employees, including his brother. Lea was born in Brooklyn, but the family moved to suburban Queens when she was four. She remembers a happy and idyllic childhood together with her sister, playing punchball, riding bicycles, and best of all playing school, in which Lea was the teacher. Lea always wanted to be a teacher. Not surprisingly, she loved school. She remembers her childhood house as a palace and was surprised when she visited it many years later to discover it was only nine hundred square feet. Lea still maintains her friendships from childhood, these many years later. It was in high school that Lea met Charlie Moskowitz, the stepbrother of a good friend, not surprisingly in the orchestra.

Lea went to Temple University and got a degree in Elementary Education. While at school she attended the famous March on Washington in America for Civil rights in 1963, as part of the American Jewish Congress delegation. College was also a wonderful experience, not too far from home, as the romance with Charlie continued. Lea loved music, a common interest for the two. She was able to graduate a semester early to get married and move to New York.

Because it was in the middle of a school year, she could not get a teaching job, so began working in life insurance in the accounting department. Her first teaching job in the fall was in Brownsville in Brooklyn, a tough and challenging school. Fortunately, after a year, Charlie got a job in suburban New Jersey and Lea was able to get a teaching job there. It was a wonderful experience, as she described the attitude towards teachers in that school district as “walking on water.” However, even with two salaries, buying a house was out of their reach and in 1972, the Moskowitz’s decided to head south, to South Daytona.

In more affordable Florida, they were able to buy a house and Lea initially stayed home to start raising a family while Charlie pursued his career as a musician, both teaching and performing. Once the children were of school age, Lea started working part time, for the new Trails development in Ormond Beach. However, after four years she went back to full-time work at her first love, teaching. She worked as a teacher in gifted elementary education classes and went back to college for advanced certification. In the end, she had a distinguished 25-year career in teaching before retiring.

Lea's love of Judaism focused more on the culture. She enjoyed going to shul and especially loved the music and singing. She adored the cantor in her synagogue growing up. Raising a young family, she and Charlie were members of Temple Israel where her sons, Marc and Daniel went through their Hebrew education receiving their bar mitzvah. However, they were part of the ten families that looked for a unique experience and were part of "the family" that formed Congregation B'nai Torah in 1998. After her retirement, Lea's new job, or labor or love, became supporting our congregation. It involved everything from catering to running a gift shop, including two years as President.

Lea's parents never had the time to travel and see the world. After her mother died, her father expressed his regret that he had never given his wife that opportunity. After he died in 1988, Lea and Charlie began their travels around the world and Lea "talks to her father," sharing with him the experiences that he missed. Also, wherever they go, they seek out the Jewish communities, or traces of Jewish communities that existed in the past.

Lea feels we are fortunate living in our part of Florida where there is now no trace of antisemitism. She was raised to abhor any prejudice and to always look for the good in others. The hate and sad state of affairs in the world is difficult for her to comprehend. One might look at Lea's life; idyllic childhood, education in the field she loved, marrying her high school sweetheart with a long and happy partnership, successfully raising a family, having the career she always wanted, becoming the rock of our wonderful congregation and finally traveling the world, and marvel at her "good fortune." But Lea has always looked for the good in others and through her special qualities, has brought out the best in them. So, her happy life is no accident and there is something we can all learn from that.




