# The Presidents' Message



Dear Fellow Congregants and Rabbi Kane,

I hope you are all well, staying hydrated and keeping cool in our very warm summer of 2025!

I have been pondering where to begin this month's newsletter to all of you for the past few days, and I keep on coming up with the same answer, share from my heart, so that is exactly what I will do.

First, I must say, I love and respect you all. We may not always agree, we may see diverse ways of accomplishing what is good for B'nai Torah and its Congregants, but in the end, we all want what is best for our place of worship. Those of you that volunteer, I am in awe of your commitment and dedication.

**With that being said, some of us have more resources than others, I am reaching out to you for your support and assistance. We have buildings that need tender love, and care; we are changing our Security Company and engaging the Ormand Police Department for many reasons and I will touch on that a little further down; we have and are still attempting to raise funds and grants from FEMA and other resources with little traction. So, this does not come easy for me, please reflect what Rabbi Kane and Congregation B'nai Torah has meant to you, has influenced you and your families with cherished memories. And today continues to do so with our programming, events, and services. Please reflect on that little extra (or a lot extra if you can) to the General Fund, so we can continue to be the extended family to all. Whatever you share will be a blessing and a mitzvah.**

Now for the serious stuff, I am sharing two parts from our last board meeting, the D'var Torah, and my closing thoughts: Do you ever find that something upsetting to you could be equally exciting to someone else? Every person could be faced with the same situation, and they would react to it differently. We often cannot control what we are faced with, but what we can control is our perception of it. With this week's energy, realize the way you look at something is the way it will be. Know that your consciousness is what creates your reality.

And my closing thoughts: What is the purpose of all our spiritual work? To weaken Amalek, to weaken the Negative Side, to weaken the forces of chaos, death, and destruction in this world. And we do that the same way we give it strength. To the degree that we see pain and suffering in the world or in ourselves and say that it is real and will remain, is to the degree that we give strength to the negative forces. This does not mean we are not realistic in what we see. But what it does mean is that we see beyond it and say, ‘Yes, I see terrible darkness; however, it is not real, and it is not staying. I do not believe it. I do not accept it. I do not give it strength.’ That is our job: to weaken the Sitra Achra. The only thing that is real is the Light of the Creator, and when we awaken that thought, consciousness, and way of seeing, we diminish the strength of the Negative Side.

Why the change in security for Congregation B’nai Torah, I will start with a little history, Martyrs of Blois (1171) The 20th of Sivan is the anniversary of the first blood libel in France. On this date in 1171, tens of Jewish men and women were burned alive in the French town of Blois on the infamous accusation that Jews used the blood of Christian children in the preparation of matzo for Passover. Antisemitism has taken many forms over the centuries, too many atrocities to even touch on. Our current situation in Israel is devastating and painful, Rabbi Shapiro this past Saturday morning service shared the many who recently lost their lives, both civilians and military, young and old. We know it will not stop there, conflicts will continue, and unfortunately so will Antisemitism. It is our responsibility to protect our precious community to the best of our ability with love and commitment.

We are Jews, we are the faithful, we have had challenges that many have succumbed to, we continue with love and dedication. So, I will quote my father Henry, may he rest in peace, “Howard, when life gets tough, bend down, pull up your bootstraps, and keep on going!” As Jews, I believe this sums up the core of who we are.

Thank you, Rabbi Shapiro, for leading services in Rabbi Kane’s absence. Much appreciation to Melanie, Kitchen Angels, Sisterhood, and Men’s Club for your focus, dedication, support, and especially the tuna and egg salad!

I look forward to this year of listening, having conversations, laughing, and creating new memories with you. With compassion, mercy, intent, and love, wishing your health and prosperity.

# MENSCH OF THE MONTH

## **March “Mensch of the Month” Howard Silverstein**

Our July “Mensch of the Month” Congregation B’nai Torah’s President, Howard Silverstein, has had an active and eventful life. The constant theme, of which our congregation is a grateful beneficiary, is the desire and ability to help people, make their lives more enjoyable and to help to make anything he touches run more efficiently and smoothly!

Howard’s grandparents emigrated to the United States through England from the Pale of the Russian Empire, escaping the programs at the end of the 19<sup>th</sup> century. They arrived at Ellis Island and settled in the New York area, his grandmother’s family in Brooklyn, his grandfather in Jersey City. His father was the patriarch of a family of nine brothers and sisters. His father settled in the family home in Jersey City. Economically, it was not an easy start, as his father started work selling candy out of the trunk of his car. Eventually, he became a candy and toy salesman for Saffer and Simon Company. Howard remembers his first job as an eight-year-old, helping sell candy door to door. His first paying job as a 10-year-old was wrapping candy for the company. Howard had two older brothers; the oldest was fourteen years older. The second was only four years older, and Howard was “the accident” of the family.

To this day, Howard can never understand how his father could afford it, but summers were always spent on the Jersey shore. In third grade, Howard was accepted into a special experimental school, which taught innovative methods and science, which he loved. He grew up undecided as to whether he wanted to become an astronaut or lifeguard. In his summers at the beach, he became an assistant lifeguard, and he still remember incidents saving lives. Unfortunately, the experimental school only lasted through sixth grade, and he went back to public school. By then the neighborhood in Jersey City had changed and ethnic and racial tensions made it a difficult and dangerous place that taught Howard lessons in coping that served him well in later life.

Howard received an academic scholarship to college. He initially studied at Trenton State and then transferred to Rutgers. By this time, he was unsure of his goals and studied first psychology and then geology and archeology. In the end, he concentrated on culinary school and hospitality and finally received his degree at Roosevelt University in Chicago.

Thus began a whirlwind career of increasingly responsible positions, first directly in culinary work, moving up to a Food and Beverage Director. This led to becoming a General Manager of Clubs and Marketing in larger organizations. Geographically, he moved to all corners of the United States from California to Florida to Chicago, back to the northeast, multiple times. He worked for some of the largest and best-known corporations in the United States, Ramada Inn, Sheraton, Prime, Playboy and General Foods. At the same time, he was honored to become an adjunct professor and a lecturer at universities about hospitality and culinary organizations, starting with NYU. Howard developed an expertise and reputation as a “turnaround specialist”; taking an organization that was struggling and making it work and become profitable. He enjoyed himself and thrived on challenges. His multiple job changes were because of his growing reputation and recruitment by organizations that need a fix!

Finally, back home, with his father’s health failing, his brother (four years older) asked him to come home. Together with investors, they purchased a property in Connecticut with a restaurant, night club, apartments and businesses and asked him to manage it. After his father’s passing, he moved to Port Orange, where he worked as Senior Business Director of Development and Hospitality for Entegra for all North America. Retiring from that job two years ago, he remains active as a consultant with his company Hospitality Dynamic Solutions.

This whirlwind and active career was understandably stressful in his personal life. Yet Howard has five daughters, ranging in age from 36 to 21 and is anxiously hoping for grandchildren which have not yet arrived....

Howard grew up in an orthodox Jewish home and received his bar mitzvah. All his life, he did his best to be a part of the religion, and his daughters received bat mitzvahs. But the constant moves made it difficult to ever be a part of a Jewish community. He recalls their Mikvahs as moving events in his life. In the past few years, he has begun to seriously study Kabbalah and believes that he now is feeling a more spiritual connection with Judaism, and it has become a core part of his life. He credits our Rabbi Kane with helping him make this connection. He considered it a singular honor to be offered the presidency of Congregation B’nai Torah.

Howard’s wide-ranging career has given him deep insights into all aspects of American life and beliefs. He is sensitive to the dangers of antisemitism and considers it one of his responsibilities as our president to help protect us from its potential dangers.

Howard’s remarkable career has demonstrated his special abilities, and we are indeed fortunate at Congregation B’nai Torah that he is one of us and truly deserves “Mensch of the Month” as he guides our congregation as our president.







## TREE OF LIFE


The Sanctuary of Congregation B'nai Torah houses an impressive Tree of Life, donated by Dr. & Mrs. Richard Rhodes.
